Lessons in Thriving with GIST Welcoming a New Global Liaison - Donncha Lynch

In 2012, Donncha and his wife, Oihana, relocated from Ireland to Australia due to an economic recession. Despite the promising job opportunities 'down under,' facing GIST away from family and old friends presented a significant and unexpected challenge.

Donncha initially experienced common symptoms like abdominal pains and constipation, leading to inconclusive test results. Despite a misdiagnosis of a parasite and rounds of antibiotics, he remained distracted by life's busyness until a severe attack left him unconscious. Rushed to the emergency room, suspicions of a heart attack were replaced by the discovery of a large tumor and several smaller ones in his gastrointestinal tract, marking five challenging days for Donncha.



"I was first told it was potentially another type of cancer with a very poor prognosis. So those first five days (in hospital) were something you never want to go through," said Donncha.

After concluding it was GIST and not another cancer, he began imatinib resulting in tumor reduction evident at his 12-week scan.

Donncha didn't know much about GIST or The Life Raft Group yet, but he was determined to learn all he could. He was classified as wildtype and needed to know more.

"I set out to empower myself. Through Google, I found The Life Raft Group and to be honest I probably read every article on the website. I watched a majority of the webinars. I learned about everything - molecular testing; all the terminologies. I started to make connections through the Facebook groups and through the Australian/New Zealand GISTers, and I met some Life Raft Group people through that sharing. These were some really good conversations," said Donncha.

The surgeon on his multidisciplinary medical team was not hopeful about Donncha's situation.

"I decided to seek a second opinion. The surgeon who was part of the multi-disciplinary team and who cared for me since day one had said a few times, "It's a big operation, Donny. It's going to be 9 or 10 hours and you might have physical consequences that could be very challenging for a very long time." I decided to seek a second opinion. so the search for someone else began." Donncha shared.

Donncha, after consulting with a highly experienced GIST surgeon, opted for surgery despite complications that extended the recovery. Fortunately, the outcome included clear margins, a more optimistic prognosis, and post-surgery scans indicating no evidence of disease. Test results classified him as exon 11, and due to the tumor's size and location, he's considered high-risk, requiring ongoing imatinib treatment. Overall, a significantly improved prognosis compared to those first five days.

As liaison, Donncha is eager to share what he's learned about how to live with GIST and about being a self-advocate. His goals in this role are to empower people to go out and find answers, connect with others on this journey, and to encourage others to get professional mental health services even if they don't think they need it.

"In this role that I'm doing for The Life Raft Group, I am engaging with people. I'm sharing my story. There's a bit of courage involved but that's where the most rewards come. When support was offered to me for mental health, and though I'm a very optimistic person, I went to see a psychiatrist. At first I thought it would just be ticking a box, but I met a really good psychiatrist...

...and got a tremendous lot from the sessions. She really knew where I was coming from. She involved my family. She taught me how to talk to my nine-year old daughter, Haizea. Oihana came along for some sessions and she learned a lot about how to deal with her own suffering."

Support groups are important:

"I'm in this men's mental health management group here in Sydney and we meet for a swim and a coffee once a week. They're a great bunch of guys, all at different stages of life; some are going through relationship issues, some addiction issues, some health battles. I can't explain the rush of endorphins or whatever that is, to be able to share your story in a circle of trust."

His best advice for newly diagnosed patients is educate yourself.

"I know not everyone is tech savvy or likes to read, but join the LRG, find someone on the same journey to connect with. If I hadn't done these things, I might not have gotten the mutational testing, or a second opinion. For all I know, I might not have been here talking to you if I didn't do my research and find another surgeon, who did an amazing job that didn't have catastrophic effects on my physical activities."

A very big part of having GIST is realizing how much your perspective on life changes:

"I have down moments event though I probably come across as a very strong guy, but you will have some very sad moments, and through this I've come closer to God, have more intimate relationships with my family, I'm leaned into mindfulness and meditation and I'm very invested in being self-aware and being a better man. I've no idea how long I have and I want to be the best version of myself from now til whenever. I want to give it 100% as often as I can and be ok with it when I can't. This experience has changed the way I look at life so drastically. I would have never have thought of these things before."

Patients stories illustrate the heart of the a patient's journey living with GIST. Stories like Donncha's not only encourage and inform our community, but help others know that they are not alone. The 2023 ESMO Congress

The European Society of Medical Oncology Congress was held in Madrid, Spain October 20-23, 2023. This meeting is a highly influential oncology platform for clinicians, researchers, patient advocates, journalists, and healthcare industry representatives from all over the world. There were 155 countries represented through 207 sessions. Over 33,000 participants including over 580 speakers attended the Congress at the famous IFEMA Madrid. In addition, 2,545 abstracts were presented with 198 mini-orals and 2,200 posters.

The Life Raft Group's Executive Director, Sara

Rothschild and I attended this year's ESMO Congress. This was the first time The Life Raft Group has attended ESMO. We are proud to share that two of our abstracts were accepted as posters.

We attended GIST and sarcoma focused sessions including a session sponsored by Deciphera Pharmaceuticals on the expert perspectives: management of advanced GIST - now and in the future; a session on genetic predisposition in patients with sarcoma; mini oral sessions that included updates on


clinical trials for GIST patients; ctDNA in relation to tumor volume in GIST; and other sessions that were generalized to sarcoma management.

The Life Raft Group team was proud to be recipients of the ESMO Patient Advocate Travel Grant which helped support travel for the conference. To receive the grant, we attended all the patient advocacy focused sessions that were held during the conference. These meetings were very informative on how to support patients and caregivers as a patient advocacy organization.

When we were not presenting our poster, attending GIST and sarcoma sessions or patient advocacy sessions, they were able to meet with industry partners

to discuss ways

to further strengthen the relationship between the LRG and industry to better support patients relating to access to treatment and care. We also met with leading researchers and clinicians from all over the world to discuss future collaborations and to push research further and discuss how we can work together to increase research.

ESMO Congress 2023 was a very fruitful meeting that allowed for the LRG to present two posters, connect with leading physicians and researchers, network with industry and raise awareness of The Life Raft Group's presence within the patient advocacy community as well as the research community as an organization that is devoted to supporting patients through research and advocacy.


LRG POSTERS AT ESMO

Identification of SDH-Deficient GIST Increases After the Implementation of Diagnostic Algorithm in Life Raft Group (LRG) Patient Registry Data


- This study used a diagnostic algorithm that was created due to the LRG GIST Patient Registry which emphasizes the need for targeted diagnostic procedures. The algorithm has been implemented in the College of American Pathologists (CAP). The objective of the study was to evaluate data results after the algorithm's implementation. Results included a comparison of the LRG GIST Patient Registry's 2017 dataset with 2022 dataset. The 2022 dataset had an increase of 60% of identified SDH-deficient after using the diagnostic algorithm.

A Registry-Based Analysis of the Projected Genomic Landscape Among Unclassified KIT/PDGFRA Wildtype Mutations in Patients with Gastrointestinal Stromal Tumors

- This study aimed to understand unclassified and unclassified KIT/PDGFRA Wildtype (WT) mutations. The frequency was completed by using retrospective data from LRG GIST Patient Registry and calculating the frequency



distribution of classified KIT/PDGFRA WT who had further mutational testing than just KIT/PDGFRA mutational testing and using that distribution to estimate the mutation frequency in the unclassified KIT/PDGFRA WT. The estimation allowed to project the entire cohort distributionby assumption that unclassified KIT/PDGFRA WT would have a distribution similar to that of classified KIT/PDGFRA WT patients. The estimation allowed for a more accurate representation of the actual mutation frequency of GIST patients, enhancing the understanding of GIST genetic landscape within the LRG GIST Patient Registry.



The Life Raft Group's Impactful Participation at the CTOS Conference

On November 1st to the 4th, Executive Director Sara Rothschild, Senior Director of Data Management, Data Analyst Jerry Call, and I attended the Connective Tissue Oncology Society (CTOS) conference in Dublin, Ireland. The conference provided a platform to highlight the crucial role of collective efforts in advancing research, patient care, and advocacy in the field. One ultra-rare Sarcoma session emphasized the urgency and significance of collaborative work in the sarcoma landscape. The Life Raft Group continues to work towards closing the gap and strengthening collaborations among multiple institutions for unification and advancement in Sarcoma research.

A notable mention during the conference was The Life Raft Group's recent publication in *Nature Medicine*, focusing on the intriguing topic of placebos. This paper added a valuable dimension to the discussions, providing insights into a nuanced aspect of sarcoma research. The conference offered a conducive environment for networking with new colleagues and reconnecting with familiar faces. Interaction with the broader scientific community was enriching, allowing for the exchange of

ideas and experiences.


As part of the conference agenda, The Life Raft Group actively participated in the CTOS Sunrise Mentorship meetings. These sessions offered valuable insights into different topics, ranging from how to get involved in CTOS to global networking opportunities. The engagement with other members further strengthened the commitment to collaboration and knowledge-sharing.

The conference featured diverse sessions, including "Improving Sarcoma Care Globally," "Immunology and Immunotherapy," "Novel Diagnostic and Bioinformatics," "Adolescent and Young Adult Sarcomas," "Clinical Trials in Progress," "Preclinical Models and Translational Research," and a comprehensive session dedicated to GIST. These sessions provided a comprehensive overview of the current advancements and challenges in sarcoma research and care.

A significant highlight was the strategic planning session with the medical advisory board, where upcoming projects and publications were discussed. Brainstorming sessions

paved the way for innovative ideas and plans for 2024. During the conference, the team had the privilege of meeting with multiple patient advocacy group leaders. Engaging with other advocacy groups proved to be a mutually beneficial experience, fostering support and shared learning among diverse communities dedicated to tackling rare diseases.

A pivotal moment occurred during a meeting with Dr. Joanna Pryzbyl, McGill University Health, and Dr. Xiaolan Feng, University of Calgary, and Dr. David Josephy, GIST Sarcoma LRG Canada, to kick off an exciting biomarker testing project. The aim is to study key biomarkers to enhance prognostic tools, aiming to detect recurrent disease early for timely consideration of more aggressive treatments. The Life Raft Group's commitment to advancing research was evident, as this project, jointly funded by the LRG as well as GIST Sarcoma LRG Canada, promises to contribute significantly to the understanding of sarcomas.

These discussions proved invaluable, providing a unique opportunity to glean essential insights into ongoing clinical trials and the latest advancements in sarcoma treatment. The organization prioritized these interactions to stay abreast of cutting-edge developments in the pharmaceutical landscape. Learning key information about clinical

trials, potential therapies, and emerging treatment modalities further empowered The Life Raft Group to be a well-informed advocate for the sarcoma community. These fruitful exchanges with pharmaceutical representatives underscored the importance of collaboration between patient advocacy groups and industry partners in advancing research and improving outcomes for individuals affected by sarcomas.

The Life Raft Group had the honor of presenting in the GIST session, where Jerry Call highlighted the organization's impactful contributions. The title of this presentation was "Recurrence-Free Survival in Gastrointestinal Stromal Tumors Is Correlated with Mutation Type: Results from the Life Raft Group Patient Registry." During his presentation, he emphasized the multiple variables that play a role in the recurrence among patients. He also announced that the organization will be embarking on a multi-institutional project with members from the US, Spain, Poland, Norway,

Germany, Netherlands, Canada, and Australia, to understand and optimize risk classification in GIST. The team is very eager and excited about this upcoming collaboration.

Additionally, the team was also involved in Dr. Ashwyn Sharma's oral presentation from UCSD Moores Cancer Center, showcasing the collaborative spirit within the scientific community. "Application of Single Nuclei RNAsequencing of Human Gastrointestinal Stromal Tumors to Define Tumor Cell States for Inferring Intra- and Inter-tumoral Heterogeneity from Bulk Transcriptomes" discussed the intra- and inter-tumor cell heterogeneity of human GIST.

Closing the conference on a high note, The Life Raft Group presented two posters, titled "Longitudinal Follow Up of Gastrointestinal Stromal Tumors: Data from The LRG International Patient Registry" and "SDH Natural History Study." These posters showcased the organization's dedication to advancing knowledge and understanding in the field of sarcoma, as well as an important outcome from the data collected within our GIST patient registry. The organization would like to thank its patients and caregivers for their infinite support and participation in the patient registry.

Additionally, amidst the packed conference schedule, The Life Raft Group had the distinct pleasure of meeting with a caregiver of one of our youngest SD-deficient GIST (Succinate Dehydrogenase) patients residing in Ireland. Despite the demands of the conference, the organization made a dedicated effort to carve out time for this special interaction.



Upon reflection, The Life Raft Group expressed immense satisfaction with the successful outcomes of this conference. The wealth of knowledge gained, collaborative initiatives established, and the enthusiastic participation in various sessions reaffirmed the commitment to supporting sarcoma research. 
